TOPIC: Money Museums, What Relevance & How Sustainable?

Introduction

- The International Council of Museums was established in 1946,
- museums have come in different shapes and sizes, particularly in recent years
- Anything related to human life and daily existence can be turned into a subject of collection in a museum: 'perfume museums', 'watch museums', 'hat museum', Fashion museum, Money & Banking Museums etc.
- Money or any form of substance of monetary value as used by early societies in their different ways of exchange, transaction & trade is also celebrated & displayed through a museum.
- Money and Banking Museums have come in different shapes all over the world
- Some general museums such as the British Museum house 'Money Galleries'

What are money or Bank Museums

- Money or Banking museums reflect the history and the narrative on the evolution & use of money by early societies
- from the earliest barter system and the use of cowry shells to the current paper money and coins
- Anything from cowrie shells, banking coins/notes etc have been displayed in museums
- to today's technology through stock markets and modern-day innovations of electronic money.
- This also now encompasses numismatic study on the same, which looks at the physical properties of money, production technology, specimens of currencies
- Numismatic Associations, institutions have come up with their own collections and money museums

How Relevant are Money Museum

- Recognition by ICOM & establishment of the International Committee for Money & Banking Museums
- What is the relevance of money museums: to states, private sector, local communities, to young people, scholars
- What is their historical, social and economic significance to society
- What relevance or contribution to technology, economic challenges and to today's money conscious society.
- How sustainable are such institutions
- What new forms of technologies are put in place to ensure the security of such museums
- their collections, exhibitions & displays
- The sensitive displays i.e. notes, coins etc which are at times still in use.

How Sustainable are Money Museums

- This study seeks to explore the development and adoption of the museology of money and banking by different countries; America, Europe
- what is the rate of development as compared to other museums, i.e. ethnographic, historic, archaeological museums etc.
- Close scrutiny on Botswana where the first Banking & Money Museum has just been inaugurated after a decade of museum service in the country.
- What could have led to this delay in Both Botswana & other African countries
- there are only twelve Banking and Money Museums in Africa, out of all its 48 countries.

They are participatory and transparent, and work in active partnership with and for diverse communities to collect, preserve, research, interpret, exhibit, and enhance understandings of the world, aiming to contribute to human dignity and social justice, global equality and planetary wellbeing."

- The Money/Banking museums should engage in more projects with local communities and to help fund local initiatives where possible because as money and Banking museum, the wrong assumption is that they are automatically rich
- Higher and International Financial bodies such as the IMF, World Bank should be engaged to help support some of the struggling money & Banking museums.
- To share findings from this project through publications, video documentaries, journal articles, exhibitions.
- The ICOMON Newsletter, if any should cover activities of these museums so that they are also celebrated and put in the lime light

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
